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PLOT OF THE STORY

- ♦ narrator Scout Finch lives together with her older brother Jem and their older widowed father Atticus, a lawyer
- ♦ they have a friend who comes during summer, **Dill**. Scout and Dill like each other.
- ♦ the three have a lot of fun together especially trying to get "Boo" Radley out of his old, mysterious house, but they never succeed in seeing him
- ◆ Atticus is appointed to defend a black man, **Tom Robinson**, accused of having raped a white woman, Mayella Ewell. Many people disapprove, taunt Scout and Finch and even try to lynch Tom.
- ♦ at the trial, Atticus proves that Mayella and her father **Bob** are lying. Nevertheless Tom is convicted guilty and **shot** when trying to escape from his innocent imprisonment
- ♦ being humiliated at the trial, Bob vows revenge. He assaults Scout and Jem on their way home.
- ♦ suddenly Boo Radley appears and helps them to escape. Jem breaks his arm and Bob accidentally gets killed by Boo Radley.
- ♦ the town sheriff declares this as an **accident** (he also knew that Tom was sentenced innocently)
- ◆ Scout now knows who Boo really is and **understands** what a valuable, likeable neighbour she has

IMPORTANT THEMES AND THEIR HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

- **♦** racial injustice and Southern life
 - "Jim Crow" laws were in effect until 1964 segregation of black and white everywhere
 - "caste system" with a strict social hierarchy and racial injustice (e.g. Tom's sentence) especially in the South (high density of black people) lead to social tensions
- ◆ social class hierarchy and genealogy (i.e. your relatives) decide upon your value as a person
 - e.g. Bob Ewell, though living on the junkyard, is white and "(trust-)worthier" than any black
- ◆ courage and compassion (book, e.g. Atticus) in real-life, e.g. the Civil Rights Movement

LITERARY GENRE

- ◆ **Southern Gothic** part of Gothic literature; exclusively from the American South
 - gothic and **grotesque** (irritating) elements to create suspense and explore **social issues** and the **culture of the South** book, e.g. mysterious Boo Radley, mean-grotesque Bob Ewell
- ◆ **Bildungsroman** "Coming-of-Age" story, describing the growth and change of a character
 - youthful naivité and good faith are confronted with real injustice, evilness, segregation
 book, e.g. Jem and Scout do not understand why Tom is convicted guilty.
